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Black Dogs, Baidhbs and Ghosts!

"There's fairies up around Dunhill, There's goblins between Smoor and Kill, There's ghosts go leor near Carrolls Cross, And baidhbs and pucas down near Ross".



Everybody had an uncle who saw a ghost or a granny who heard the baidhb. Fairies were everywhere and our parish had some of its very own.

The Headless Coach (An Coiste Bodhar)

The headless coach or the headless horses, was always seen and heard over at Reisk. The coach came from Reisk by Ballydermody, to Fenor and on to Tramore. It was heard regularly at Islandtarsney. "If you were out at night and heard horses coming we'd run like the wind for fear 'twas the headless coach".

The Collegians

There were twenty-nine small houses on the knock between Power's forge, Landy's boreen and Ardnahoe boreen. On fine summer evenings, when the days work was all done, the women would sit outside on the stone ditches. They said that they could sense or see the Collegians going from Islandkane churchyard to Dunhill. No one knows who or what the Collegians were except that they were spirits.

Strange Haunting near Fenor

Fenor village was haunted by two nuns, who walked the roads from the bridge at the Kilfarrsey road to the bridge at Finnegan's land (below the church). These two nuns walked the road from one bridge to the other. Ghosts and spirits were trapped in the triangle between the streams. It is also believed that ghosts and spirits cannot cross a ploughed field.

The Baidhbe (Baib or Biab)

The baidhbe was regularly seen on the roads around Fenor. She was a ghost like woman with a long drawn face who drifted from place to place screeching at the top of her voice. She was dressed in white and was very frightening to see or hear. She was regularly seen on the Kilfarrsey road near the little bridge and also between Fenor Church and the school. Over in Ballyscanlon she was seen at the Baidhbe's Rock which is on the ditch near the entrance to the forestry. The baidhbe also roamed the road near Annestown Bridge. She was also seen near the church at Reisk and she floated up and down the main road at Islandtarsney.
