- The third National Collection for the <u>50th International Eucharistic Congress</u> will take place next weekend and there's a yellow envelope provided in your box at home for this collection. We thank you for your generous support to date and we ask you to give what you can to assist us in the preparations and the hosting of the 2012 Eucharistic Congress. Further information on the 2012 Congress preparations is available at www.iec2012.ie. This year's Peter's Pence Collection has been postponed for a few weeks.
- One of the key moments in the pastoral preparation for the 50th International Eucharistic Congress is the celebration of a short <u>National Eucharistic Congress</u> at the end of June. On Saturday 25th, pilgrims will travel from every corner of Ireland to Our Lady's Shrine at Knock. There will be workshops on Communion and Eucharist presented by Fr. Kieron O'Mahony OSA, Prof. Robert Enright, Rosemary Swords and Fr. Tom Norris. The heart of the National Congress at Knock will be the celebration of the Eucharist, preceded by the anointing of the sick. During the Mass, a large candle with the Eucharistic Congress Logo will be blessed for each of the twenty-six cathedrals in Ireland. These will be brought back to each diocese to be placed at the centre of a diocesan celebration the following day. Our diocese has organised a bus for anyone interested, leaving Waterford at 7.00 a.m. and costing €40, which this includes morning coffee and a three course evening meal. On Sunday 26th all parishes will send a family whose child received their First Holy Communion this year to the 12 noon Mass in the Cathedral. The Bishop will present them with a Eucharistic Congress Candle, which they in turn will present in their parishes the following weekend.

- The final **Do This in Memory Mass** for this year will be celebrated in Fenor Church at 6.30p.m. next Saturday evening, June 25th, which is the feast of Corpus Christi.
