Eastern Christians calculate the date of Easter according to the Julian Calendar, the calendar in general use before the Gregorian reform of 1582. Sunday, 15th April 2012 is the feast of Easter for Eastern Christians. The Jewish people celebrate the feast of Passover this year on 07th April (15th of Nisan 5772), beginning at sundown on the previous evening and continuing for seven days.
