 Question: The new translation of the apostles Creed says that Jesus descended into hell. Was Jesus really in hell for three days? Answer: The hell of eternal damnation is not what is meant here but that Jesus, in his dying, embraced all who had died before his time. The scholar might argue that the word 'hell' originally meant any hidden or covered place such as an underground grave where the dead are buried. But for most people nowadays hell means the state of eternal damnation. What is communicated by words is what the listener understands which is not always the dictionary's meaning. This is simply a bad translation. The translation we had for 40 years, 'He descended to the dead' was a much better expression of what the Creed means.
